SUMMER GARDEN WORK EXPERIENCE PROGRAM

We are working to build an agroecological work experience program. Agroecology is the study of the interactions between plants, animals, humans and the environment within food production systems.

This program aims to introduce interested students to the possibilities of regenerative agriculture and traditional food systems, to help empower a flourishing, biodiverse food future.

About

The program is coordinated and hosted by the Edward Milne Community School Society. The EMCS Society's Garden Coordinator, who has 15 years of experience supporting youth garden learning, will be present as a supervisor at all times. The Society will provide Work Safe coverage for all participants and insure all participants complete appropriate safety training.

An enrolling teacher from the Sooke School District #62 will provide support in orienting students to this program. The enrolling teacher will oversee the administration of Work Experience 12A or 12B.

Location

Program will take place one day per week at Edward Milne Community School and one day per week at Royal Bay Secondary. Participants will be responsible for getting to and from each location.

Requirements

To be eligible to enroll in this program, students must:

- Have completed CLE 10
- Be at least 15 years old
- Be in grades 10 or 11

What Students Learn

Land Care:

- How to build soil health to support vegetable, shrub and tree growth
- How to propagate and care for a wide variety of annual and perennial plants
- How to create habitat for local animals (birds, insects, bats and snakes)

• How to produce food sustainably without the use of chemical fertilizers or pesticides

Job Skills:

- How to manage your energy and work effectively as part of a team
- How to communicate clearly and effectively to diverse audiences, in diverse mediums (online, in person, over the phone)
- How to manage money and lead sales at farmgate stand
- Opportunities to pursue careers in food systems innovation, agriculture and land care

Sustainable Technology:

- Rainwater capture and storage
- Waterwise irrigation systems
- Appropriate use of a variety of hand and power tools

What Students Get

Course Credit: Everyone who completes this program will receive 4 credits for completing Work Experience 12A or 12B.

Resume Experience: This program will look good on resumes for a wide variety of jobs. Your program supervisor will be able to provide detailed references to support your future job or education applications.

Ideas and Advice: This program will expose you to a variety of opportunities to further pursue education and work in fields related to food, sustainability, environmental restoration and community development.
